COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS **November 2011**

The Council met on Tuesday, November 15th. In attendance were: Pastor Thane, Mary Kasakove, Ray Mueller, Jeanne Scalora, Demetria Laird, Sibylle Schroeder, Ed Sekula, and Shelli Skeels.

The worshipful work of the Council is patterned after the four main components of our Sunday morning worship: Gathering, Word, Meal & Sending.

Gathering: We come together for worship, the work of the people

The Council shared corporate confession and forgiveness and the peace.

Word: How has, how is, and how will God speak to and through us?

Council shared a time of reflection on our work, based on Luke 4:5-6.

Minutes of the October Council meeting were approved. Written reports were received from Pastor, Fellowship, Finance, Mutual Ministry, Social Ministry, and Worship & Music.

Pastor reported on progress of the narthex coffee bar. She also asked for Council help to widely publicize the Covenant Players' visit on Dec. 4th. Pastor moved that the letter of resignation from the Blakeys for their council and chairmanships be accepted; their resignations were accepted with regrets. Pastor has completed the annual review of the membership roster and will be contacting inactive families.

Mutual Ministry held their first meeting on Tuesday, November 1st. At that meeting they adopted a mission statement and goals, reviewed the results of last year's ministry review team, and began work on this year's ministry review. These items were shared with Council.

Mary Kasakove reported for Property, which is currently vacant, that the stair repair has been completed; everyone is very happy with the results. The next major project will be repairing the patio.

Social Ministry reported that sign-ups have begun for Thanksgiving baskets. They will once again be collecting socks for distribution at Faith Kitchen.

Meal: God feeds us. How will our work feed others?

Council shared the Lord's Supper.

Old Business included updates on: the stewardship campaign – responses this year were very poor, there was some brainstorming for the future; the soil remediation project – work continues; the stair repair – work completed, many have remarked how good it looks; and the 2012 budget – everyone is invited to be a part of the process.

Council spent their visioning time brainstorming ideas for fund raising for special projects.

New Business: Entrance patio repair – this will be our next big project, beginning to seek ideas and bids; Ministry review committee – being handled by Mutual Ministry; A request from Mary Kasakove to use the sanctuary for a dance workshop on Dec. 3rd and 10th; A discussion of the need to create an emergency shelter plan/caring plan for the community.

Sending: We are blessed to bear Good News. How will we?

Newsletter articles were planned out. The next Council meeting will be on Tuesday, December 20th. The meeting concluded with prayer.

Except for Executive Sessions, which are kept confidential, members of the congregation may attend all Council meetings and/or request to view the full meeting minutes.

Mid-Week Evening Prayer During Advent

Beginning on Wednesday, December 1st at 7:00 pm, Abiding Peace will hold mid-week services using composer Marty Haugen's liturgy, **Holden Evening Prayer**. Written in 1985-86 when Haugen was musician-in-residence at Holden Village, a Lutheran retreat center in Washington State, this lovely setting is traditional in form but contemporary in sound and language. Marty Haugen has written a total of four liturgies for the ELCA, including "Now The Feast and Celebration" which has proved very popular with our congregation.

Please plan to attend these special services. Through music and text, we are reminded that although the light of day is fading, Jesus Christ is the light of the world and will not be overcome.

Did you know?

Evening Prayer, traditionally known as Vespers, is one of the seven prescribed prayer services observed by monastic communities throughout the day. The other services are Matins with Lauds, Prime, Tierce, Sext, Nones, Vespers and Compline. Matins, the morning service, was traditionally celebrated at 12:00 am - something to think about when you're having trouble getting out of bed on a Sunday morning!

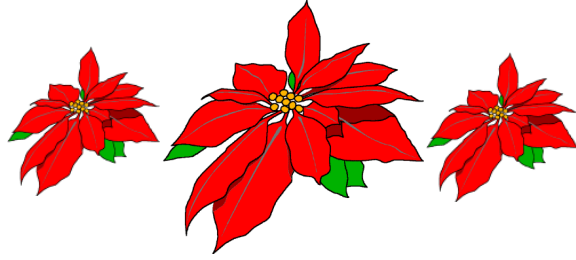

What do you give the person who has everything? Consider Alternative Giving!

Wikipedia says: Alternative giving is a form of gift giving in which the giver makes a donation to a charitable organization in the recipient's name, rather than giving an item. Examples of Alternative Giving include the ELCA's *Good Gifts* program (www.elca.org/goodgifts), World Vision (www.worldvision.org), Lutheran World Relief (www.lwrgifts.org), and *Heifer International* (www.heifer.org/gifts). And, of course, you can always give a financial gift to your favorite charity in honor of your gift recipient.

Alternative Giving can also include other socially and environmentally conscious efforts such as purchasing only fairly-traded goods. Fair trade advocates the payment of a higher price to producers. Fair trade works with marginalized producers and workers in order to help them move towards economic self-sufficiency and stability. Examples of stores that sell only fairly-traded goods include *What In The World* in Hackettstown (www.whatintheworld.info), *Ten Thousand Villages* (www.tenthousandvillages.com), and *SERRV* (www.serrv.org). You can purchase Fair Trade coffee and chocolate in our Narthex. We will also take special orders.

You might also wish to consider purchasing gifts whose proceeds support charitable causes. For example, a few of my favorites are the *World Wildlife Fund* (www.worldwildlife.org/how/shop/gear.html), the *Smithsonian Institution* (www.smithsonianstore.com/home.jsp), or the *National Zoo* (<http://store.fonz.org>).

A recent survey was done on U.S. Catholics. The survey showed that one in four Americans call themselves Catholic. 88% of those surveyed say, "how a person lives is more important than whether he or she is Catholic." Lutherans may find that many of them might say the same thing. What has your experience been? What about Jesus?

The survey also disclosed the percent of those who say the following church teachings are very important to them:

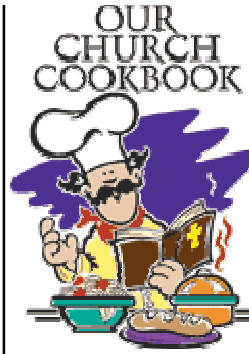
Jesus resurrection – 73%
Helping the poor – 67%
Mary as the mother of God -64%
The Sacraments – 63%

Daily Prayer – 46%
Opposition to abortion – 40%
Devotions – 36%
Opposition to same sex marriage – 35%
Accepting Vatican authority -30%
Opposition to the death penalty – 29%
Requiring celibate male clergy -21%

As Lutherans, how would you rank the importance of these teachings? Oddly, Jesus sacrifice on the cross is missing. "On account of Christ our sins are forgiven" This statement is included on almost every page of the "Apology of the Augsburg Confession." One page includes it seven (7) times.

Soil Remediation Update

In October, Abiding Peace received additional funds of about \$21,000 from the New Jersey Underground Storage Tank Fund. This money covers most of the soil remediation costs from our former leaking oil tank. We hope to hear soon about our application for supplemental funding from NJ DEP to cover the remaining disposal costs for 90 tons of soil. This contaminated dirt, more than was expected, is stockpiled out behind our fellowship hall. Our environmental contractor is working to have it hauled away before this winter.

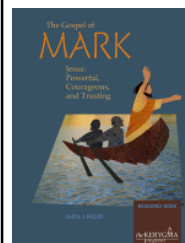
