John Mark and I were enjoying the 5th day of our Caribbean cruise by snorkeling in St. Thomas when WHAM! the unexpected happened. I slipped and fell on the deck of our snorkeling boat's deck, landing with my full weight on my left shoulder. Oh, the pain! But despite the pain, we carried on with the rest of our plans for the day. When we returned to the cruise ship later that afternoon we both agreed a visit to the ship's doctor was in order.

X-rays and a full range-of-motion test, and I walked out of the medical bay with my arm in a sling and a handful of medications. For the next three days I could hardly use my arm, relying on John Mark's help for the simplest of activities, things I'd previously taken for granted. After arriving home, a visit to my doctor, an MRI, a visit to an orthopedist, and I've been diagnosed with a rotator cuff tear and will undergo at least a month's worth of physical therapy.

So what does this all have to do with the church? Well, it's had me musing on the nature of pain, and humbling myself enough to both recognize my need and ask for help.

Pain isn't completely a bad thing. Pain is a warning that something is wrong and needs to be attended to.

In my discussions with various members of the congregation there seems to be a sense of dissatisfaction. There's a feeling that things aren't going the way people would like. This is the "pain" in our congregation.

In my physical therapy I've learned that in order for my muscle to heal in the best way possible, it needs to be pulled and stretched to best make room for the new tissue that will grow into the tear. We, as a congregation, know that we need to grow and stretch in order to address that pain of dissatisfaction. But just as physical therapy can sometimes be painful, growing and stretching as a congregation can sometimes be painful, too. It calls for us to move and behave in new ways that aren't necessarily comfortable.

This is where relying on someone outside ourselves for strength and support is so important. I often need help while I'm healing. And I'll be honest... I don't like asking for help to do the simplest of tasks! I'm used to being completely self-reliant. This experience is teaching me new things about humility and the nature of friendship with those people who are helping me out.

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS **May 2011**

The Council met on Tuesday, May 24th. In attendance were: Pastor Thane, Mary Kasakove, Ray Mueller, Beth Blakey, Demetria Laird, Jeanne Scalora, Sibylle Schroeder, and Ed Sekula. Bruce Kleindienst from Thrivent was a guest.

The worshipful work of the Council is patterned after the four main components of our Sunday morning worship: Gathering, Word, Meal & Sending

Gathering: We come together for worship, the work of the people

The Council began its meeting with corporate confession and the sharing of the peace.

Word: How has, how is, and how will God speak to and through us?

Council shared a time of reflection on how to make the best use of our resources, based on Philippians 4:11b-13.

The minutes of the April Council meeting were approved. Written reports were received from Christian Education & Youth, Finance, Property, and Social Ministry; Oral reports were given by Mutual Ministry, Property, and Social Ministry. Mutual Ministry is working on filling out its team; Property is working on obtaining sun-darkening window film for the sanctuary; and Social Ministry reports that they need additional volunteers to cook for Faith Kitchen.

Council spent their visioning time hearing a presentation from Bruce Kleindienst regarding some of the programs that Thrivent has to offer our congregation.

Meal: God feeds us. How will our work feed others?

Council shared the Lord's Supper.

Old Business included:

An update on the status of the coffee bar installation in the narthex; the ladies will be asked to select the color countertop.

A recap of the 40th anniversary celebration – a great time was had by all!

An update on the soil remediation project. Council unanimously approved execution of a contract with Allegiance Environmental to complete this project.

An update on the progress of the solar energy working team.

New Business included:

A discussion of the finances and re-examination of the budget

Information provided regarding the NJ Synod Ministries Fair on June 4th, in which our liturgical dancers will participate.

Council designated all future receipt of Thrivent Choice dollars for the Coffee House ministry.

Don Larsen provided ruminations on the meeting and our group process.

Sending: We are blessed to bear Good News. How will we?

Newsletter articles were planned out. The next Council meeting will be on Tuesday, June 21st. The meeting concluded with a sending prayer, including concerns from this meeting.

Grant Received for Soil Remediation

A few years ago Gerry Ayotte urged us to replace our underground oil storage tank, buried outside past the end of our Fellowship Hall. Such tanks could eventually leak oil into the soil and cause us to have an expensive environmental liability on our hands.

With financial support from our members, two new tanks were installed in our basement, and then on September 30, 2009 our old tank was dug out of the ground. That day we learned both good news and bad news. The tank had already been leaking oil into the soil, probably for years. It had eight small corrosion holes in the base. Truckloads of dirt would need to be hauled away. Soil samples were taken and the topsoil was put back in place temporarily.

The good news was that the state had in recent years set up a fund specifically to help homeowners and nonprofits remove underground storage tanks and do any necessary soil remediation. The money comes from an assessment on the sale of heating oil, and we qualified for it.

The application process took more than a year, but in April of this year we were given final approval of a grant of \$25,505. Soon afterwards, the fund ran out of money! No new applications will be accepted until 2014. But thank God, money for our grant was set aside. In fact, we received in May \$3,850, reimbursing us for the new tanks and removal of the old one. So we have these funds back. But at the moment, they are being used as the down payment on the remediation work to be done this month by Allegiance Environmental Services of Morristown. This will cost up to \$21,655 and be paid for by the rest of the grant.

So this is why you may soon see some major digging, backing and filling on our property. Approximately forty tons of contaminated soil will be hauled away for proper disposal in Pennsylvania, and replaced with about forty tons of clean fill and twenty cubic yards of topsoil.

Thankfully, the right thing for our environment is being done, and at no cost to the church.

Evangelism June

The June issue of The Lutheran contains an article on 10 trends to watch. Since not everyone receives The Lutheran magazine, I thought I would summarize the 10 trends:

1. Declining Church participation – fewer attending worship
2. Growth in no religious affiliation – increased from 5 to 15
3. More spiritual, less religious – 18 to 39 year olds
4. A new stage: Emerging adulthood – exploratory, autonomy, transience
5. Changing family structures –marrying later; fewer children
6. Increasing social, cultural, and religious diversity – race and ethnicity
7. Influence of Hispanic/Latino faith – Holy, catholic, apostolic and Lutheran
8. Influence of individualism – right to express individual religious preferences
9. Living in a digital world – 47% involved in electronics – facebook, twitter, etc.
10. Increase in adults over 65 – 1 in 5 by 2050

Supporting this last trend the last census showed a 30.7% increase in senior citizens in Morris County; 70.8 in Mount Olive. It also showed a 15.9% drop in children under 5; Mount Olive showed a 14.5% drop.

We need to be constantly aware of our Ministry Outreach in our communities in view of these trends. If you have any ideas, please let us know.
