For our May focus in Confirmation class, we explored what it means for the church to be "the Body of Christ." This biblical image is a powerful metaphor that teaches us about the mystery of being bound together by Christ with a common life and purpose. At the same time, the very familiarity of the language can make it difficult to really ponder the significance of the imagery. "The body of Christ" becomes one of those churchy phrases that becomes disconnected from the physical experience of how lungs and heart supply life to the extremities; how joints move through the pulling of tendons against bones; how pain and pleasure travel through the nervous system and can be isolated in only the spot that initiates the sensation.

In order to move past the overly familiar metaphor of the body, each student had the task of developing their own metaphor for the church – considering all the factors that play into the biblical metaphor of the body. They had to think about how the different roles of different church members work in their metaphor – why diversity of roles is needed and how they all work together for a common purpose. The student's metaphor were really something.

One student talked about the church as a stage production. We have a script to follow, and a director and lead actors – pastor and ministry leaders – who are most visible. But other roles are important too. The 'pit orchestra' (musicians) helps to shape the experience and the emotional tone. The stage crew (behind the scenes folks like altar ministry and those who bring food for the food pantry) makes everything work even though we might not notice them. And the who congregation is part of the ensemble, with an important part to play, even if they don't have any lines.

No one in the church is in the audience. That role is reserved for the world we serve and the God we worship. Another student compared the church to a soccer team. Again, there are more visible roles like the coach and the team captains, but everyone on the team matters, even the bench players. And so do the fans who cheer the team on, giving them energy, and the team parents who bring snacks.

The final student analogy was from Dungeons & Dragons, where the church is the group that undertakes a quest together. On any team, you need players to bring different skills. The paladin defends against attack, but also heals (the student assigned this role to the pastor). The mage offers wisdom, just like teachers do in the church. The team needs clerics, and warriors, and maybe even some societal misfits like pick-pockets and rogues. They all have to work together to accomplish the mission set for them by the Dungeon Master (God).

These analogies are all very individual to the students who proposed them, but they all reflect the experience we share in many areas of our lives of needing to rely on each other. And each of the students shared where they saw themselves in their metaphor of the church – how the special gifts and abilities that they have matter to the church's work to fulfill its mission. It was probably one of the best conversations we have had as a class to connect the ideas of our faith to our real lives.

So, I want to challenge you, as you are reading this newsletter, to consider what your metaphor for the church would be? What experience in your life speaks to the interconnected and purpose-driven nature of the church. And within that metaphor, what is your role in fulfilling the church's mission in the world?

For members and friends of all ages, we're planning an intergenerational event: a visit to Jenny Jump State Park, where every Saturday night April - October, there are astronomical talks followed on clear nights by the opportunity to look through a number of high-powered, motorized telescopes. This is a free program sponsored by United Astronomy Clubs of NJ.

Anyone can go any week but we will go as a group on the first clear Saturday night beginning July 22. That's a near moonless night, but if it is cloudy, we'll postpone as needed to July 29 or August 5, 12, 19 or 26. The astronomers are friendly and eager to show the public such things as the rings of Saturn, the moons of Jupiter, the Andromeda Galaxy, nebulae, and of course the moon (if visible) and our Milky Way galaxy.

Please contact Demetria Laird or Ray Mueller if interested. We'll let the club know the number planning to come, monitor the sky, and confirm the night we attend. Car pooling will be arranged for those interested, and is recommended due to limited parking. The site is a half hour from the church. We should all arrive at the park after 7:30 pm and before 8 pm. Stargazing will be completed by 10:30 pm.
