In early March clergy and lay leaders from the Northern district of the NJ Synod gathered for our annual District Meeting in preparation for the Synod Assembly in May. As part of the agenda each represented congregation was asked to do some personal assessment about their greatest strengths and weaknesses within five identified categories of core mission. On the strengths side, the answers were pretty well spread out across four of the five categories, but all but two of the 15 congregations identified the same challenge area: witness.

I don't think that this trend was particularly surprising for anyone. The Lutheran tradition in North America has a long history of being "private." Our faith is deep and meaningful, but we don't tend to feel very comfortable sharing it. We worry that we will seem pushy, or make our friends or acquaintances feel uncomfortable if we talk about our faith or (*winces a bit*) invite them to church. And, of course, larger cultural trends encourage this reticence. On the East Coast, at least, we are most definitely living in a post-Christian culture in which many people have negative associations with Christian faith due to their own past church trauma or due to voices associated with a judgmental, oppressive Christianity in the bitter culture wars. It is understandable that we do not want to activate defensive responses by bringing up our faith. But this leaves a challenge for our church, because sharing the truly Good News of God's love for humanity remains a core calling of our faith, and is perhaps all the more important when some of the loudest voices representing Christ in our culture are communicating such judgment.

Our church Council has spent some time thinking about how we can more actively engage and equip our community for outreach and witness and we hope to develop these ideas in the coming months. In addition, the focus for worship in our Easter season will be on the call to witness and what that can look like in our lives. At the heart, however, witness is not actually a complicated

task: it just means talking about what we know. We don't have to learn any special techniques or strategies. We just have to tell our own stories like we do in any other area of our lives where we experience joy.

As one, perhaps silly, example: a few weeks ago I had an eye exam and left the optometrist's office with new "multi-focal" contact lenses. The new technology allows for both distance and up-close vision and it is wonderful! So, I shared my great news. I made a social media post, and mentioned it to friends in conversation, and had a number of conversations with folks who became interested in exploring the new technology for themselves. That's what witness looks like – it's just sharing something good in my life with no agenda to "convert" anyone, but because of my joy others get interested in learning more for themselves.

So, don't get nervous about the sermon series on "witness." I'm not conscripting anyone into street corner evangelism, and nor is Jesus. Witness is just another word for sharing the joy and meaning of our lives with the people around us.


