In early February of 2020, back when we were only just starting to hear about COVID and had no idea how it was about to disrupt the entire world, we held a special service of Healing for Mental Health for the greater Mt. Olive community. Members of Abiding Peace, and a few other community members gathered for worship on a Friday night to pray, sing songs of lament and healing, and hear from God's word a very important message:

When you are overwhelmed by despair and by the pressures of life... God wants you to have a nap and a snack.

This message is drawn from 1 Kings 19:1-8 and the story of the prophet Elijah collapsing under a tree out in the wilderness, after being threatened with death by King Ahab and Queen Jezebel. In his isolation and despair, Elijah cries out to God to kill him because he feels forsaken and lost. In response, God sends an angel to bring him food and tell him to sleep, and then to repeat this provision and instruction when he wakes up. As a person living with both depression and anxiety, this story is one I have often clung to when life feels overwhelming. I read it to remind myself that God does not judge my depression. When I get into that space of pain, God wants me to take care of myself. This is not to reduce mental health care down to "a nap and a snack." I also have a therapist, and I take medication, and I nurture numerous resources to help me through the hard periods with my illness. But in the context of my spiritual life, it is deeply healing to know that my depression is not a failure of faith. God understands and God nurtures us when we are overwhelmed by the conditions of our lives or minds. (If you are interested in the sermon from the Service of Healing, it is posted <u>here</u>).

Continued from page 1—Pastor's Column

I'm re-sharing this message because, after more than a year of pandemic, I feel like it has a much broader application to the conditions we are all living through. I have heard from many of you how the isolation, fear, and disruption of the pandemic has impacted your mental health. People who do not have underlying mental health disorders are nevertheless being impacted by the on-going trauma of the pandemic. People who do have prior mental health disorders may have resources to cope, but those resources have been strained by the extended duration of the crisis. Our society as a whole is experiencing pervasive trauma and that takes a toll. Even though we are seeing the light at the end of the tunnel. Even though restrictions are slowly being lifted. We are still dealing with the cumulative strain of all that the last 14 months have involved.

So, if you find yourself slumped under the strain... if you cannot concentrate like you think you should, or you are snapping and irritable for no apparent reason, or you just feel constantly exhausted and stressed, remember Elijah. When we have passed our limits, God does not demand that we keep functioning. God sends a messenger to tell us to have a snack and take a nap. It's okay to stop and rest when everything is just too much. And after 14 months of pandemic, it's okay if everything is just too much.

Fifty Years and Going

This is May of 2021, and 50 years ago on May 9, 1971 a Service of Organization was held for Abiding Peace Lutheran Church at the Upper Elementary School on Sunset Drive (now the Chester M. Stephens Elementary School) in Budd Lake.

Now, fifty years later, we will be doing some of the same items we did then. On May 16th we will be having a special commemorative service to remember that day. The mission developer and first pastor, Jim Parks, will be with us and participating in the service. Two things that we will be using during this service that were used in the Service of Organization is the Call to Worship and the hymn "The Abiding Peace of Christ," the words of which were written by Susan Brown, one of our charter members.

This is just the start of our celebration. The 50th Anniversary Committee was planning many events leading up to this special day. However, due to the Covid epidemic, these events could not be held. Now, we are working on putting on these events during our 50th instead of leading up to our 50th year.

We will be having a Festive Celebratory Buffet at the Holiday Inn in Budd Lake on May 21, 2022 and a "50+1"-year Celebratory Service and get-together on Sunday May 22, 2022.

We are also working on scheduling former clergy associated with Abiding Peace to be with us and give a homily for a Sunday during the late winter and spring leading up to the above weekend. You will hear more about these items and other details as time goes on.

Looking forward to the rest of this year and the next 50 years.

So What is All This About RIC?

RIC stands for Reconciling in Christ. It is the designation for Lutheran congregations that have gone through an intentional process of bible study, learning, conversation, and moral deliberation around the commitment to be open and affirming to the LGBTQ+ community and other marginalized groups. The word "reconciling" is very intentional. It reflects that RIC congregations are in the active process of repairing a relationship that has been damaged. The painful reality is that much of the Christian church has systematically rejected and shamed people for their sexuality or gender identity if it diverged from the narrow confines of heterosexuality and binary cis -gender norms. Even in congregations that have not participated in this shaming and rejection, the history of the Christian witness in the world means that there is damage that needs to be repaired. When people have been actively told they don't belong, a passive welcome probably will not ever be heard. Only active efforts to reach out and repair the damage done can lead to reconciliation.

Abiding Peace IS a welcoming community. We hear that from new visitors who quickly find community and love in our congregation. We express that welcome in a broadly inclusive welcome statement. We offer words of affirmation on our church sign for those driving past, and carefully avoid words of judgment. But that doesn't mean that there is nothing left for us to do. We can still learn. We can still create space to talk through what welcome really means. We can still seek God's guidance in discerning how God wants us to communicate the gospel of grace to the world around us.

All of these realities are why we are beginning the RIC process. We want to do the active work of reconciliation, in service of our core mission to proclaiming the gospel of Jesus Christ to a hurting world.

The highlight of this visit came when, while wondering what the lettering on the wall meant a very handsome, Omar Sharif looking gentleman approached us. We asked him to explain the meaning. He lit up and was so enthused to explain to us that these were the words of the different names of Allah. So here was an Arab educating a very interested Jew and Christian on the meanings and practices of his religion.
